What is Mennonite Central Committee?

A Christian Resource For Meeting Human Need

Mennonite Central Committee (MCC) seeks to demonstrate God's love by working among people suffering from poverty, conflict, oppression and natural disaster. Started in 1920 in response to hunger in the Ukraine, MCC is the cooperative relief, service and development agency of the Mennonite and Brethren in Christ churches in North America. MCC serves as a channel for building relationships that mutually transform lives. MCC strives for peace, justice and dignity of all people by sharing our experiences, resources, and faith in Jesus Christ.

MCC has nearly 1,200 persons in service in 50 countries around the world and throughout North America. They are involved in development work such as education, health and agriculture, job creation and economic/technical, as well as peace and justice issues, relief work, and much more.

MCC sees its role as a facilitator, not as a controller of projects and programs. Thus it frequently works with local partners such as churches, women's groups, farmer's cooperatives and government agencies.

Comforters



MCC sends bedding to hospitals, refugee

camps, orphanages, and locations experiencing disasters. In the last several years, shipments were sent to Afghanistan, Bosnia, Haiti, Honduras, Iran, Iraq, Kazakhstan, North Korea, Palestine, Russia, Serbia, Sudan and Ukraine. In 2008, MCC sent more than 63,000 comforters or blankets.

Fabric



Bolts of new cloth are frequently requested where fabric is expensive or hard to obtain.

These bolts are often used to sew clothing for children. Recipients can also use full pieces of at least 1.8m / 2 yards long for quilt and comforter pieces. Shipments during 2004 went to Nicaragua, North Korea, Russia and Serbia and totaled more than 7,800 pounds.

Why A Relief Sale?

For nearly 60 years, churches and individuals in the U.S. and Canada have organized so called, relief sales, events, or festivals, to raise money for the relief of suffering around the world. Volunteers work year-round on the planning and people congregate from miles around on the day of the sale.

These relief sales or festivals are usually held over a weekend and often include an auction (including everything from quilts, artwork, wooden products, antique cars, etc.), food stands, children's activities, musical entertainment, hands-on projects and local specialties. Auction bidders may raise the prices of items so that the money paid reflects more than the true value of the goods.

At these sales people are doing more than buying something tangible; they are reaching out to fellow human beings in need. These events give witness to their faith in Christ.

During the year at least 46 relief sales take place in 28 states and provinces. These sales generate over \$5.5 million for MCC programs in 2007.

The Twin Cities Mennonite World Relief Sale is part of this North American network of fund raising events to support the ministry of Mennonite Central Committee. MCC received \$61,000 from the proceeds of the TC Mennonite World Relief Sale last year. All items offered for sale have been donated and everyone working at the sale is an unpaid volunteer.

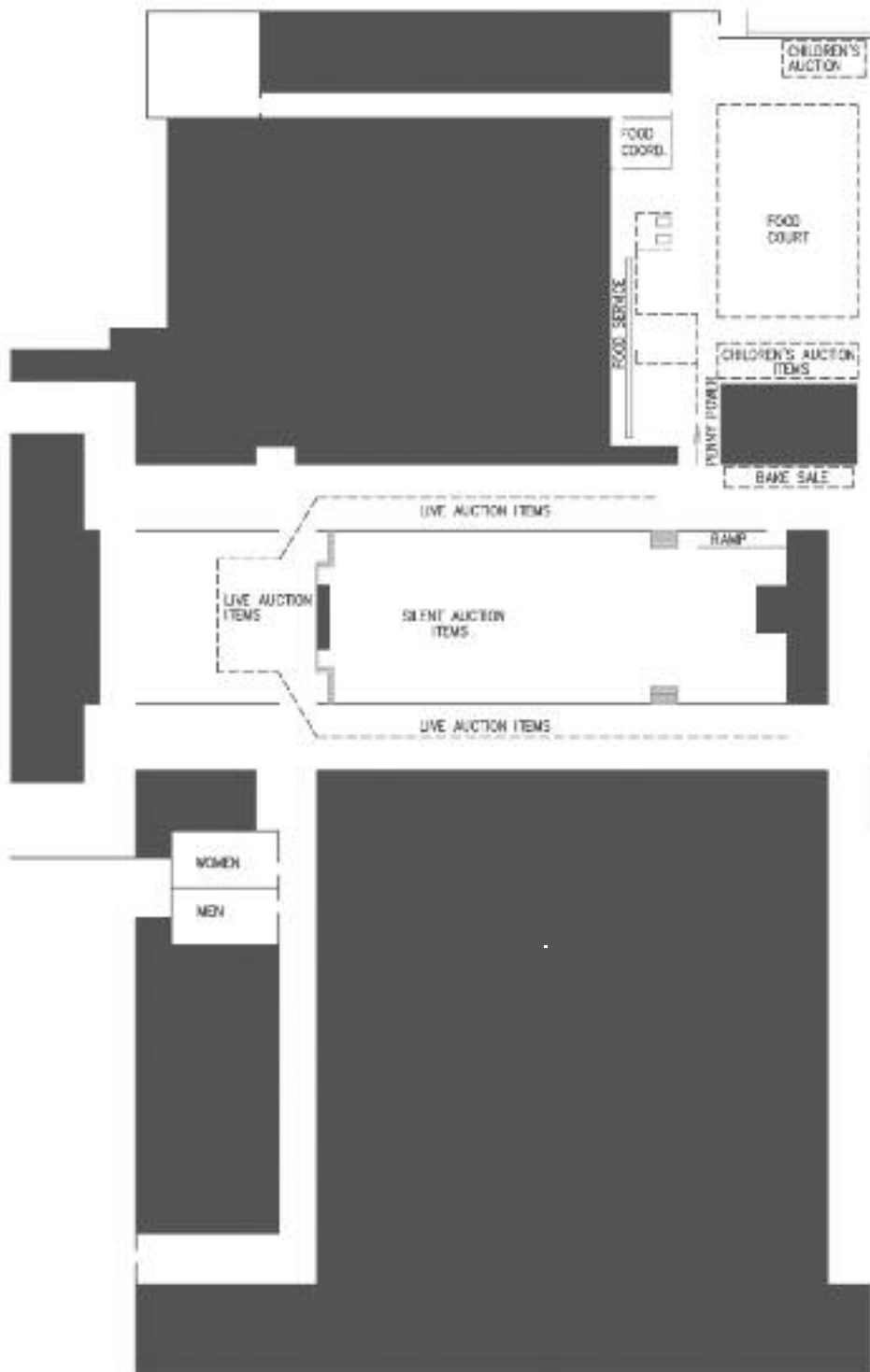

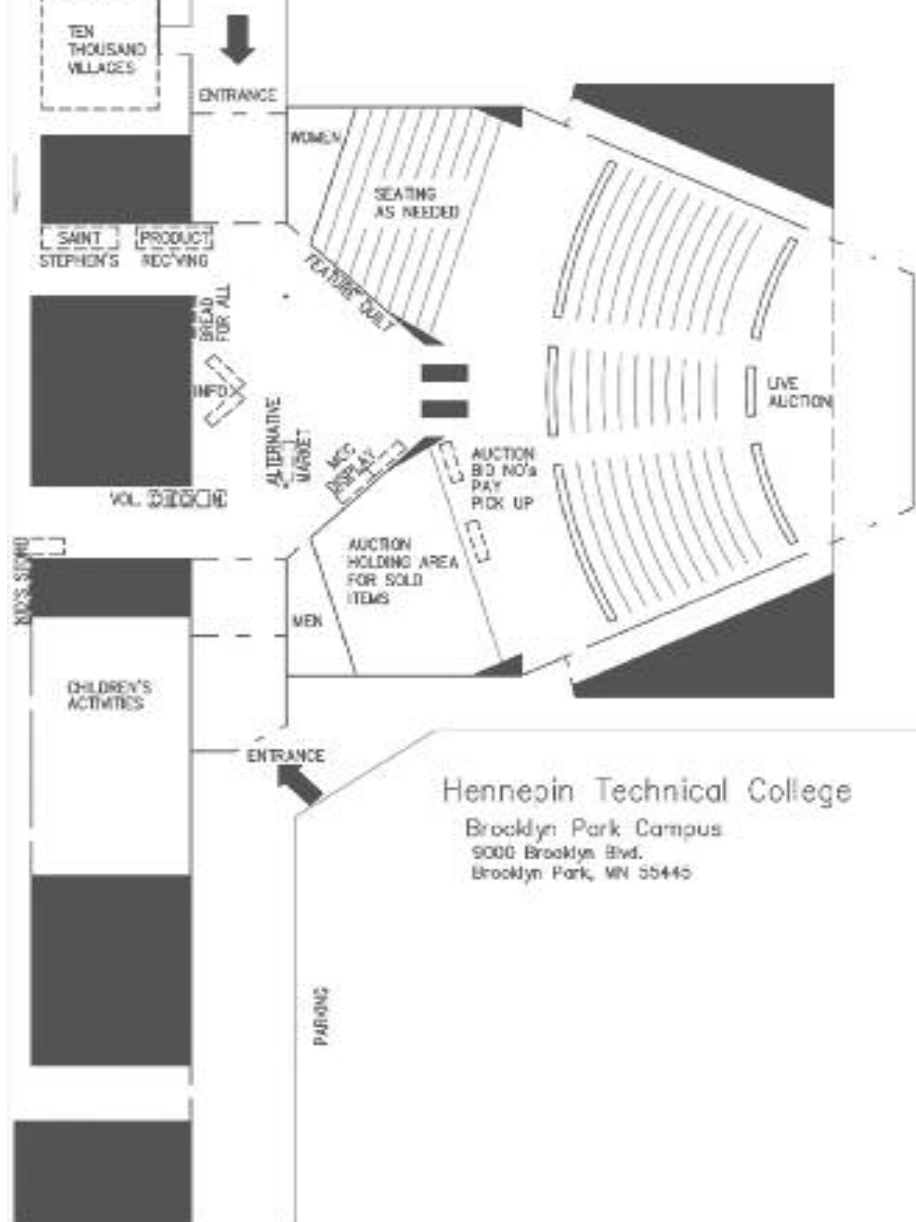

General Quilt Information

QUILTS

Usually made of cotton fabric and hand or machine quilted.

COMFORTERS

Usually made from cotton or heavy weight fabric with layers held together by tying or knotting.

TYPES OF QUILTS

PIECED: small pieces of material are sewn together to form a design. This is framed by a border and bound to finish off the raw edges.

APPLIQUE: pieces of material cut into decorative shapes are applied over the surface of another piece of fabric. These are sewn together with tiny hidden stitches.

NONPIECED: the top is one large piece of fabric with a design printed on it. This design is then quilted with fine stitches.

CARE OF QUILTS

New quilts made with cotton and polyester filler are usually washable. However, it is advisable to put as little tension as possible on the threads. Wash gently with cool water. To dry, drape over several clotheslines to distribute its weight more evenly or it may be laid flat on the grass over absorbent towels.

A quilt should never be stored in plastic. Rather, it should be wrapped in a sheet or pillowcase, which allows it to breathe. It is better to roll it rather than fold it.

White Glove Attendants: As you admire the quilts please ask a white gloved attendant to assist you in looking at the quilts to ensure that the quilts are protected until they are auctioned. They can also answer questions and share quilt information. Items being auctioned are displayed in the foyer hallways and Fireside Lounge. Come explore and see the exciting things you can buy.

Newborn Kits



MCC distributes newborn kits to hospitals, clinics and refugee camps. Newborn kits are sent to assist mothers in giving their children a good start in Bosnia, Haiti, Honduras, Nicaragua, North Korea, Serbia, Russia and Ukraine. In 2008, MCC sent more than 10,000 newborn kits

Contents (NEW items only, size 3-9 months)

- * 1 Pair socks
- * 1 Cap
- * 2 gowns/sleepers (lightweight cotton)
- * 2 undershirts/sacques/onesies (short or long sleeves)
- * 4 cloth diapers (flat-folded preferred)
- * 1 receiving blanket (mediumweight cotton or flannel; minimum 92cm / 36 "
- * 4 safety pins (5cm / 2")
- * 1 bar mild soap (110-140g / 4-5oz; in wrapper)
- * Remove packaging material (except soap) and fold into the receiving blanket. Fasten together with the safety pins.

School Kits



School kits are our most requested item. They are given primarily to refugee and displaced children, helping students and teachers add some normalcy to disrupted lives. Also areas that experienced natural disasters receive them with joy. MCC sends school kits for children in places such as Bosnia, Haiti, Honduras, Iraq, Liberia, Nicaragua, North Korea, Russia, Serbia, and Ukraine and to poorly funded schools in Canada and the United States. In 2008, MCC sent more than 120,000

During fiscal year ending March 31, 2009, \$8.6 million was purchased from artisans producing handicrafts in 36 countries. By working directly with artisan groups, cooperatives and other organizations, *Ten Thousand Villages* is able to make sure that the artisans working on handicrafts are paid fairly for their work.
